# **Brazil in a Wheelchair**

I went on holiday to Brazil by mistake! (Part 2)



In the last issue of Mo Shaol, we left Alison on a cobbled street in the town of Paraty, being assisted off the cobbles by some local people. Now, read on....

The hotel in Paraty had beautiful gardens. The wheelchair accessible room was very small and the shower absolutely not accessible. I showered most days outdoors by the pool. Often I found that accessibility meant that a member of staff was there to lift you out of your chair and carry you up the steps to Reception.

A powerchair isn't advised when visiting massive waterfalls like Iguazu Falls because you get drenched even from a distance. To avoid being electrocuted, I found a medical supplies company and arranged to hire a manual wheelchair for the day. They delivered this antiquated chair for me to use which appeared to be a commode as well as it had a toilet seat but beggars can't be choosers.

Iguazu Falls were breathtaking, literally. Neither Sam nor I could speak when we beheld their magnificence. The shock of the size of it and the noise of 62,000 cubic feet of water crashing down every second. The Falls mark the border of Argentina which you can see across the river. Further north is the Amazonian rainforest which Sam wanted to visit, and take a boat up the River Amazon, but this was not possible, at least on this occasion.



For the last few days of our trip we returned to Rio de Janeiro, which most people

know for its statue of Christ the Redeemer. It does boast a funicular railway to the top which can take a wheelchair, but as you can see Himself from every part of the city, I remained by the beach.

Taxis are super cheap in Brazil and we used them all the time. I stumbled as I climbed out of one taxi and, in the process of grabbing something to steady myself, I pulled the car door handle right off. I could see the man looking so upset, I assume that it would be expensive for him to repair on his salary. Thank goodness for Google Translate: I managed to ask him what the door was going to cost to repair. I gave him 300 Brazilian Reals which would only be about €50. He was happy with that.

The wheelchair accessible taxi back to the airport on our final day arrived and the seat was so high up that I could not climb into it. The driver pulled my arms and the hotel staff pushed my legs, while Sam tried to hold my trousers up. Embarrassing.

Brazil can be hard work if you travel with mobility issues. But it also warm, flamboyant, friendly and colourful. And, to anyone travelling to that part of the world I would say plan, plan and plan again. Then go and enjoy it.
